I heard about the internship in a business class that I took in fall of 2007. I signed up for the class hoping to learn more about business, yet it wasn't until I started the internship that I truly learned about business. The internship was of such worth that I can say that I learned ten times more about business than I ever could have in class.

The internship took me to places that I have never been before. Under the mentorship of Gavin Lantzy, the regional VP, and Chris Swenson, my District Manager, and many others, I was taught every aspect of the business that I would need for success.
